Operating notes:

□ Supervision ratio is 1 instructor to 30 participants, with 1 additional adult to assist supervision.

□ Instructor to be trained to in-house syllabus. Refresher training as directed by coaching sessions

The course should avoid areas of thorny or stinging vegetation. Wooden components that may become slippery must be covered with a textured surface. Hollows in which water may collect should be filled in, and persistent puddles drained regularly.

Risk – Benefit Statement: There is very low risk of minor cuts, grazes and bruises but high levels of participation in communication and teamwork exercises making the risk tolerable.
